# 22.1 Million Strong

#### 22.1 MILLION STRONG

AAPIs comprise just over 4% of the nation's registered voters but are among the fastest growing racial groups in America. Voter registration of Asian Americans increased 51 percent between 2008 and 2016, compared to just 8 percent nationally, according to the brief.

#### AAPIS HAVE REACHED CRITICAL MASS

AAPI registered voters make up a significant proportion of the electorate in Hawai'i and California, as well as in key congressional districts in Hawai'i, California, Georgia, Illinois, Nevada, New Jersey, New York, Texas, Washington state, and Virginia.

#### MINNESOTA


320,000 AAPIs in Minnesota and over 155,000 are eligible to vote. The population is young and under the age of 29 years. Southeast Asian Americans make up the largest Asian ethnic group in Minnesota at 60%. But there is also diversity of other groups and the fastest growing are Asian Indian, now almost 50,000 strong.

# Unifying **Perspectives**

Large in number in key geographies, AAPIs are also uniting in their perspectives. For example, among Asian Americans likely to vote in the 2018 General Election:

- 90% agreed that women and men should be paid the same wages for the same work.
- 76% agreed that Congress should pass the DREAM Act.
- 79% agreed that Congress should enact stricter gun laws.
- 79% agreed that racial profiling is a form of harassment and should not be allowed.

Looking at presidential elections between 2008 and 2016, AAPI voters' preference for the Democratic candidate over the Republican candidate reached 71% in 2016, trending up steadily since 2008.5




AAPI voters have similar beliefs on both policies and political choices, a key criteria in the development of a voting bloc.


These densely populated and growing areas translate into voting power as well. As the following chart<sup>u</sup> indicates, AAPIs turn out to vote at rates that approach overall turnout during presidential elections. Additionally, in the 2018 midterm election, AAPIs were within 5% of overall turnout, a significant milestone for AAPI voter turnout. All signs indicate that these densely populated and growing areas translate into new AAPI voting power.

There are many reasons why people are not registered to vote or have not updated their voter registration. Which of the following best describes your situation?




- Asked of the 23% who are unregistered. Up to three replies accepted
- 42% of unregistered picked at least one "motivational" barrier to registering.

  - AAPI men (41%)
  - ✓ Independents (38%)

Thinking about the 2020 election, what are the most important issues facing young Asian Americans that our politicians should address?




- Immigrants rights / DACA and ending sexual violence and harassment make it on the list.

In the past few months, have you personally done any of the following?




- Young AAPIs are active in both social movement and electoral politics.

- Republicans likelier to contribute money (37%);

# identify with movements


Do you consider yourself a member, follower, or supporter of any of the following social movements?




- % who say "I strongly align with this group" shown.

- AAPI youth strongly aligned with movements are also likelier to vote: especially for #MeToo, March for Our Lives, DREAMers




AAPI women prefer the Democratic Presidential candidate by about 5% more than AAPI men.



### **MPD150**

#### **Enough is Enough**

The first version of the report launched in 2017, the 150th anniversary of the Minneapolis Police Dept. Report 2.0 released this summer with over 100 pages of additional content

#### Making It Real

We held an art exhibit at New Rules on Lowry Ave along with a poetry slam, and opening and closing events. It was structured like our report with past, present and future.

# Community Policing and Other Fairy Tales

We released this comic in 2020 and it's also in the new report 2.0. These are comics co-created by artists and community members.

# MPD150's Five Essential Findings

- 1. The police were established to protect the interests of the wealthy, and racialized violence has always been a part of that mission.
- 2. The police **cannot be reformed** away from their core function.
- 3. The police **criminalize dark skin and poverty**, channeling millions of people into the prison system, depriving them of voting and employment rights, and thereby preserving privileged access to housing, jobs, land, credit, and education for whites.
- 4. The police **militarize and escalate** situations that call for social service intervention.
- 5. There are viable existing and potential alternatives to policing for every area in which police engage.

### Reclaim the Block

#### 2018

We came together as a small coalition, including members of Black Visions, to discuss follow up from a action held at City Hall. We won a move of \$1.1 million *new* dollars from MPD to public safety and OVP.

#### 2019

With a bit of a platform we continued to build with others who lobbied regularly and built up relationships with current sitting council members in effort to underrstand the processes better so that we could advocate better. We did not block money from MPD and they were able to add an additional cadet class.

### 2020

In May, when another life was lost to MPD and the country and world sprung into action, Reclaim the Block and Black Visions were already in a place where folks came to us for information. We had a small track record of helping folks understand the city budget and how to testify.

We could not be here without the hard work of young, Black and brown folks pushing in the streets and decades of work off the streets in moments of calm.

Black Visions has been part of M4BL and they had people who were ready to help us understand how to push in the moment as protests opened up space for conversations we thought we'd be having in 2023.

Our work has changed as many people's work has. We are working to building partnerships and trust to help folks feel able to contact their council member.



# GOTV 2020: Goals and Challenges

#### Goals

- Increase voter turnout and education, and Census outreach and education through measuring and accomplishing field metrics.
- Recruit and train leaders and volunteers to increase our community outreach, resources, voter education and Census 2020 efforts, and organizing capacity.

#### Challenges:

- Registering people online we can only help virtually.
- Lack of access to technology especially older adults/elder and LEP

- CAPI and CAAL voter guide (translated into Vietnamese, Karen, Hmong, Somali, Oromo, Spanish)
- CAPI will send out 15,000 vote mailers to households in Hmong,
   Vietnamese, Mandarin, South Asian languages
- Hosting virtual voter education workshops
- Staff to receive training on election protection with Asian Americans Advancing Justice

#### Do's and Don'ts

#### Do

- Remain non-partisan
- Start small with your own network. Get buy-in from your team at your workplace or neighborhood group.
- Let people speak for themselves
- Work together in solidarity

#### Don't

- Do it alone community organizing is about community!
- Reinvent the wheel—there are a lot of resources out there and we can share resources.
- Play the short game, elections is just one tool of many
