




# Access Karen Interpreter (for handheld device)



- Space for learning, solidarity.









- Outside critique, inside work







#### Dr. Erika Lee

Professor of History and Asian American Studies, Director of the Immigration History Research Center, University of MN

- Consistent History: Immigrants as threats to white America, Chinese people particularly targeted
- Public health scapegoating
- Built into laws and policies
- Other consequences: anti-immigrant, anti-Asian hate crimes



- US colonialism, militarized policing
- Asian Minnesotans have continually built systems to support communities
- Histories of resistance, building community power through organizing, advocacy
- Asian immigration/racial justice is tied to Black liberation





### community speakers: Individual stories

- Resettlement in under-resourced communities

Chao Yang: Outreach to Hmong, Karen communities

- Materials, outreach, community input on public health strategies
- Hedy Tripp: Particular needs of Asian immigrant women
  - Lack of access to health insurance. Collective power. HEAL act campaign

#### Dr. la Xiong: Hmong Mental Health: Community Stories

- Trauma-informed. Historical trauma is collective, transmitted intergenerationally. Triggers: racism, xenophobia
- Opportunities: creativity and innovation
- Strength- and resilience-based

## CAAL IN SOLIDARITY



**KaYing Yang** Director of Programs and Partnerships





- 65,000 Karen refugees resettled in the United States, with an additional 11,619 of the Karenni ethnicity.
- Minnesota is home to the largest Karen population both in the United States and outside of Southeast Asia with an estimated population of 17,000
- The majority of the Karen population practices Buddhism, which includes Animism. However, around 90-95% of Karen people immigrating into the U.S. are Christian
- The Burmese are the youngest Asian population group in Minnesota (20.7 years), with nearly half of their population being children (under the age of 18)
- 88% of the Burmese population in Minnesota are born outside of the United States






